Camp Update

The children's camp was an astounding success! 30 children from the school next door joined us, bringing the camp attendance to a total of 85!

The five ladies who came to run the camp arrived on Friday morning, and early Saturday morning, the camp went into full swing. Once the children were assigned to their respective workshops, they were off for a day of dancing, baking, making jewellery or learning English. That evening, there was an invitation for the kids to accept Jesus into their hearts, and 15 of them came forward. Praise God! There was also a call for those who wanted to be baptised in the Holy Spirit to come forward, and some of our kids went up.



On Sunday, the ladies spoke on healing and repentance, and the children had the opportunity to symbolically let go of their worries, concerns and negative things in their life by writing them down and leaving them on a cross. After that, many kids also came up to be prayed for.

One of our staff members had an amazing experience while the ladies were with us. On one of the nights, she was awakened by a knock on her door, followed by a voice calling out to her. She thought it was one of the boys looking for food, but when the person didn't say anything more, she fell back to sleep. Then, the voice spoke again. This time, she got up to get the door, but when she opened it, there was no one there.

She tried to go back to sleep again, but this time, she could not. So, she decided to get up and work. She went over to Mount Zion, where she heard the ladies praying and crying out to God. When she looked up, she saw smoking descending from above.



Later, we found out that at that same time, one of the ladies saw a vision of an altar. This brought to mind the description in Revelation 5:8, "*golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of God's people.*"

We thank God for the signs and wonders that He has done during the camp, and we believe that this is just the beginning of something new that God is doing in our midst.

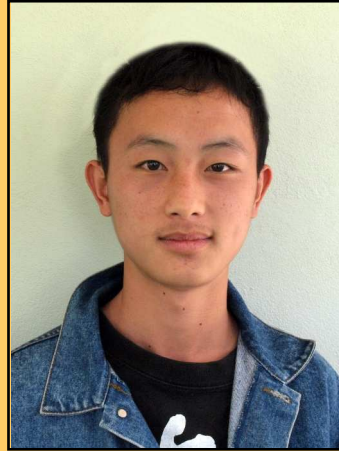
Wala man Tajima (King), 7, came to us in May 2010. He has a heart condition, and at the time he was sent to us, his mother was unable to give him proper care. His mother has since found a job, and has decided to take him back home.



Mali Songsithiwong, 19, came to us in May 2003. She is currently studying in a university in Chiang Mai city. In order to cope, she moved out to be closer to school. She is now living on her own just outside the city, and is being supported by her six siblings.



Ahpon Kongpaikoon (Fon), 20, and her brother, Bancha (see right), came to CCOF in May 2002. She left recently to take care of her mother, who is 80% blind. She is still continuing her education in the college in Chiang Mai. Her youngest brother, Chatlaew, is still with us.



Bancha Kongpaikoon, 18, and his sister, Fon (see left), came to CCOF in May 2002. He left recently together with his sister to take care of his mother. When the new term starts, he will move to the hostel to be closer to school. His youngest brother, Chatlaew, is still with us.



Prea Saesong (Mamia), 18, came to us in May 2004. She finished her secondary education at the school next door, and has been accepted into a college. Because the college is far away, she moved to her uncle's house, which is closer. He is able to support her.



Payin Sinchow, 15, came to CCOF in May 2004. Her relatives recently decided that it would be better for her to be closer to home, and took her back to her village. They will be enrolling her in the school nearby for the next academic year.



Kriansak Laoyipa (Terbler), 16, came to us in May 2007. He completed his secondary education at the school next to CCOF, and has decided to move to his uncle's place. His uncle lives in Chiang Mai, and is able to support him.



Sunee Laojang (Som Oo), 16, came to CCOF in May 2005. She has finished her secondary education, and has been accepted into medical school, where she will train to be a doctor or nurse. Because of the demands of the course, she has moved out to be closer to school.

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
